

## BINDERY & FINISHING DESCRIPTIONS


#### PERFECT BOUND



Folded pages are glued together using a flexible adhesive at the spine. Paper is then wrapped around the front and back cover leaving you with a high-end finished product and opportunity for a printed spine.

Commonly used for catalogs, paperbacks and magazines.


## CASE BOUND



Case bound is the most durable and highest quality binding method. The pages must be first sewn or perfect bound and then they are encased with a hard or soft cover. Cases can be made from leather, cloth or paper to add a personal touch to your publication.

Perfect for books, cookbooks and textbooks.

## TAPE BOUND




Tape binding uses strips of tape or cloth that are coated with glue. The strips are wrapped around the spine and front and back cover of the book. The tape is available in a variety of colors.

Tape binding is very durable and has the ability to lay flat.

#### FOLDING & SCORING

Scoring is the process of making a line or depression in paper so it will fold easier. Scoring helps to avoid cracking and to create a crisp, strong fold, especially in thicker paper stocks and materials with full ink coverage.



## SPIRAL BINDING



A low-cost binding method that uses a machine to push a hole pattern through loose pages. A spiral coil made from plastic or wire is then threaded through the holes along one side of the printed piece. Coils come in a variety of color options.

Excellent for materials that you want to lay flat or have fold under itself.






## **COMB BINDING**



This cost-effective method uses a machine to punch holes through loose pages. A plastic or wire comb is then inserted into the holes along one edge of the printed piece. Combs come in a variety of colors.

Great for thicker publications and can easily be edited if pages need to be added or removed.






Swiss bound is the method of mounting the text block, usually the inside back cover of a hard case. The spine is left free and visible and generally covered with paper, cloth or leather to add beauty, functionality and durability to the printed piece.

This process allows the spine to lay flat and creates an upscale and high-end look.


SADDLE STITCHED



Saddle stitching is a costeffective and fast option that is perfect for small booklets. Pages are nested together and wire stapled or stitched along the crease of the fold.

Great for brochures, pamphlets and small books with fewer than 100 pages.


## **SQUARE BACK**



Square back books are saddle-stitched, but then squashed at the spine to create a square edge. This gives the appearance of a perfect bound book, with a sharp edge, but at a lower price point.

As with saddle stitching, square back has thickness limitations of approx. 24-200 pages.


## **SCREW BOUND**



Screw binding involves first drilling holes through both the block of pages and cover. They are then secured together with metal screws, often referred to as Chicago screws.

This method creates an incredibly strong bind and is ideal for thick documents.
